



# Juneau School District 2015-2020 GOALS

#### **GOAL 1:** Increase student achievement such that:

- Three percentage point annual growth in number of students at each school reading at grade level as compared to National Standards by the end of third grade.
- Two percent annual growth of students at each school achieving grade level proficiency.
- Seventy percent of students at each school show one or more years of academic growth for every year of instruction.
- 4. Ninety-five percent of our students graduate within 5 years.
- Fifty percent of JSD graduates qualify for the Alaska Performance Scholarship.



#### **GOAL 2:** Implement and maintain system wide structures that support achievement, inclusion, and citizenship for all students as measured by:

- A consistent level of mean score of at least 4.20 in the "High Expectations" section of the AASB School Climate and Connectedness Survey.
- One hundred percent of K-8 schools will integrate character, ethics and decisionmaking into school wide instruction and activities.
- 3. One hundred percent implementation of adopted curriculum across the district.
- Implementation of explicit strategic interventions for 100% of students who need help achieving proficiency.
- 5. A student attendance rate of at least 95%.
