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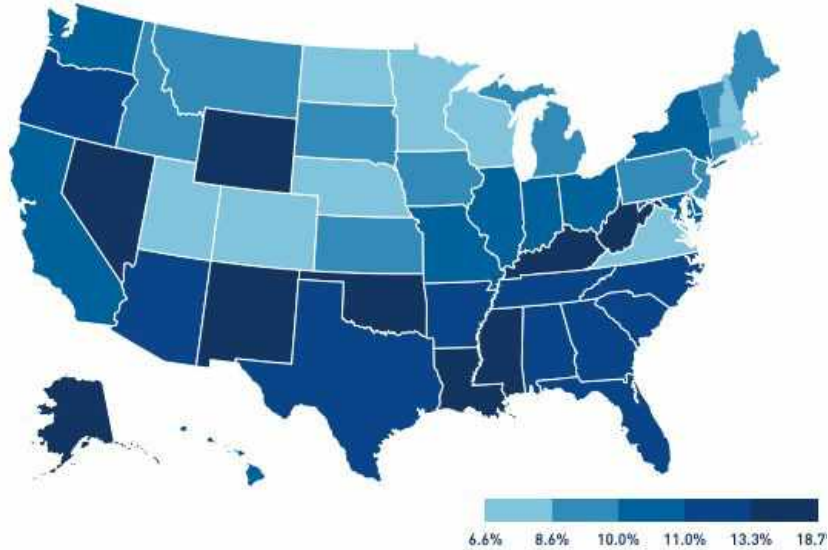

Alaska has the highest rate of disconnected youth, young people between the ages of 16 and 24 who are not in school and not working.

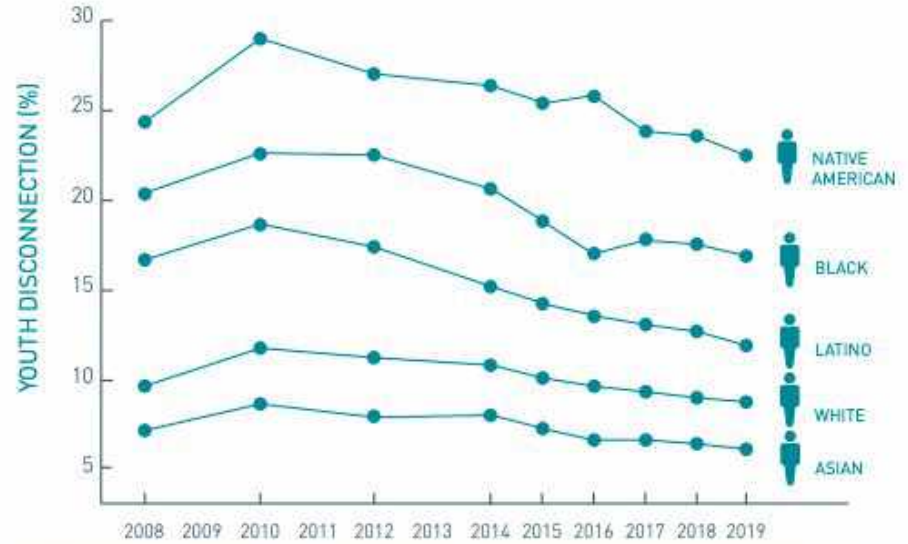
FIGURE 5 YOUTH DISCONNECTION BY STATE

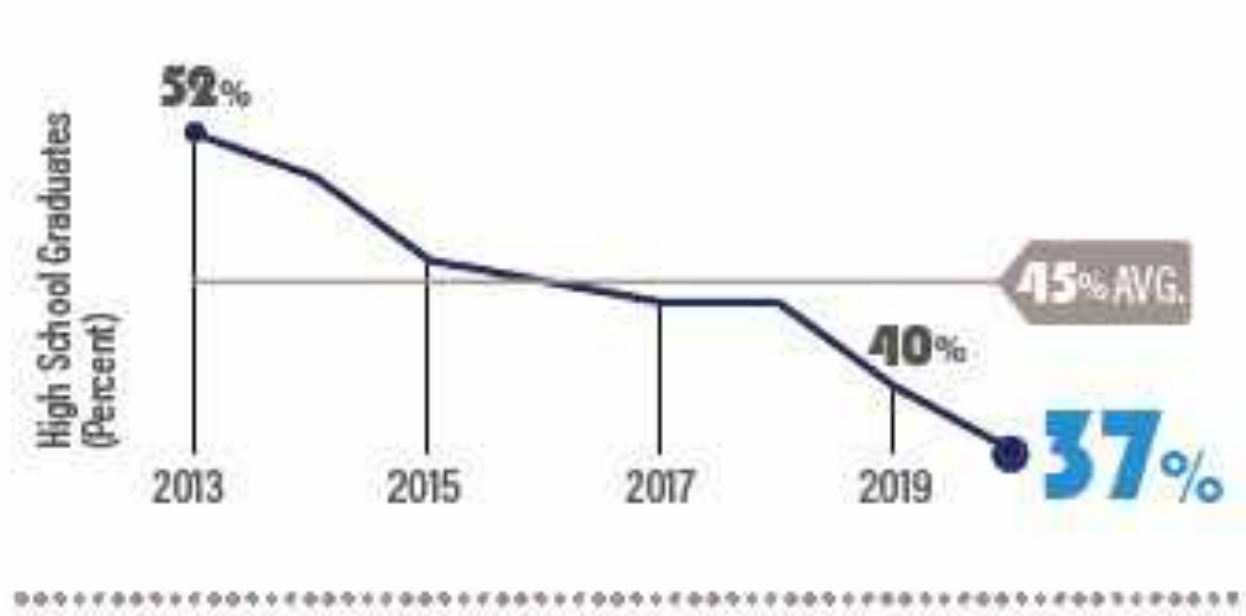

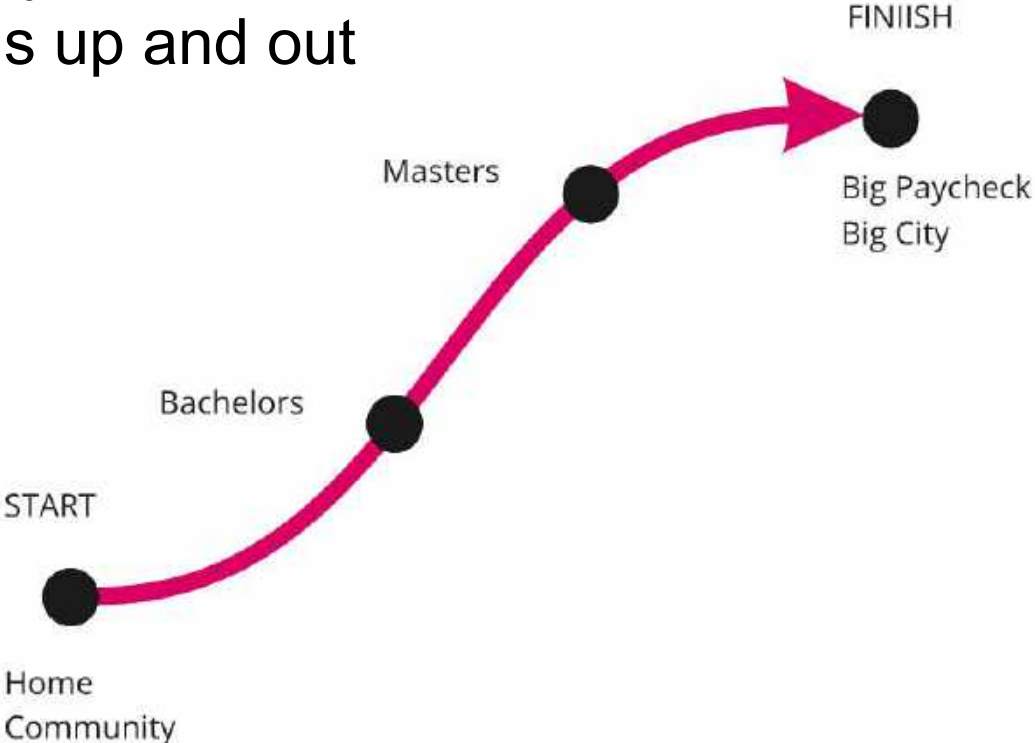

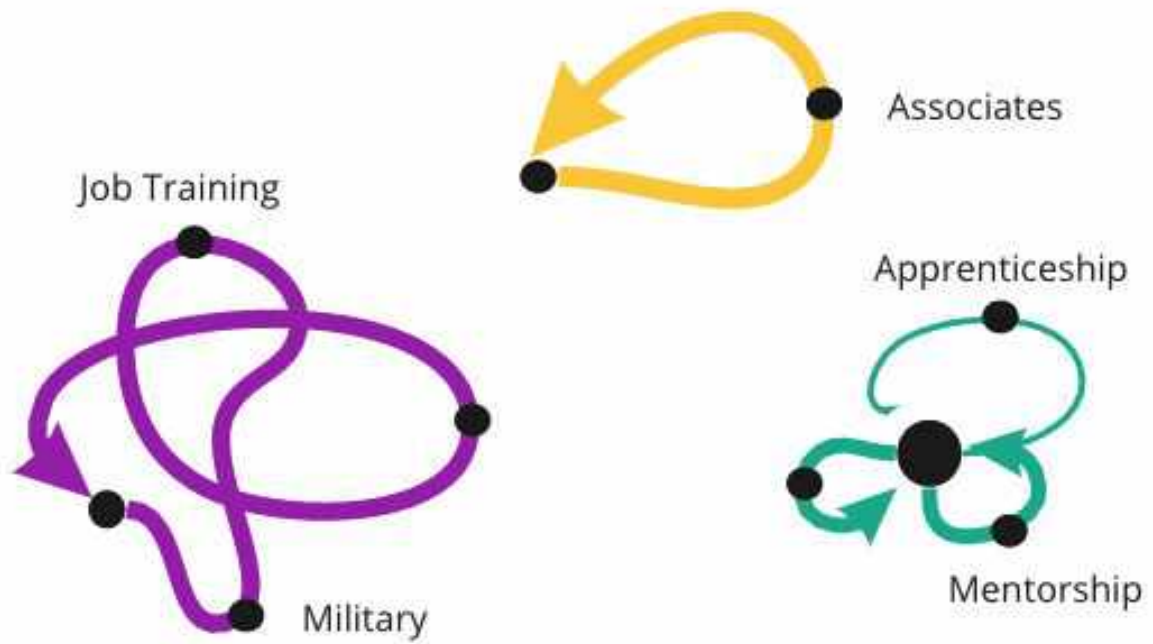

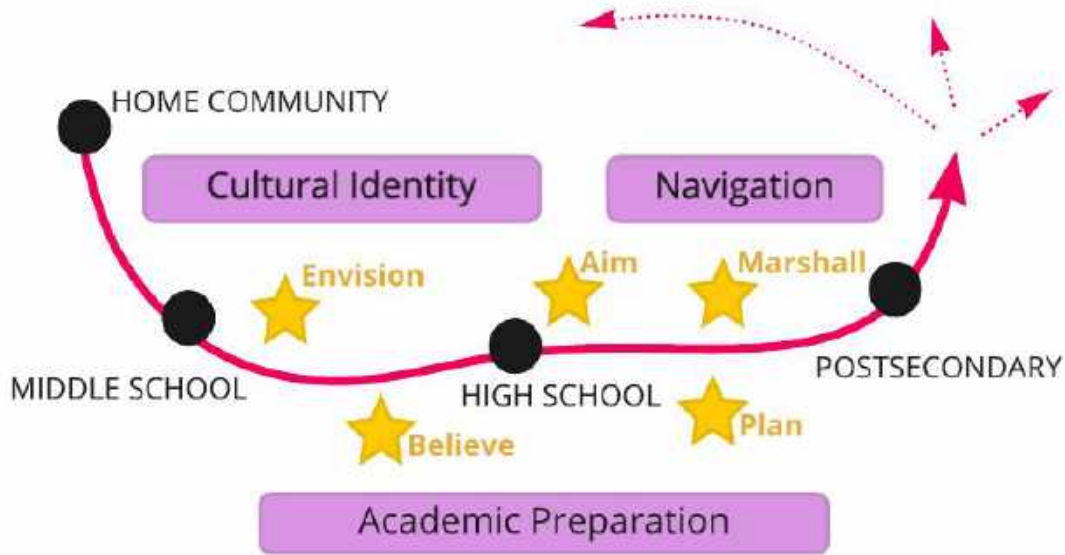

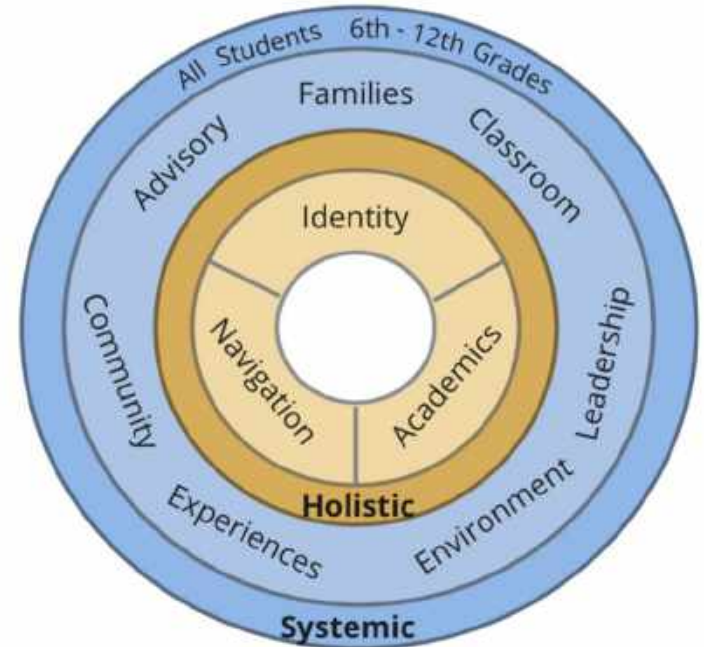

Goals



Reading Proficiency

Beginning September 2020, the percentage of third-grade students proficient in reading on the state summative test (currently PEAKS) will increase from 40% to 80% by May 2026.



Math Proficiency

Beginning September 2020, the percentage of students in grades 3–9 proficient in mathematics on the state summative assessment (currently PEAKS) will increase from 40% to 55% by May 2026.



Life, College, Career Ready

Beginning with the Freshman Class in September 2020, the percentage of high school students Life Ready and College and/or Career Ready will increase from Spring 2021 to Spring 2026.

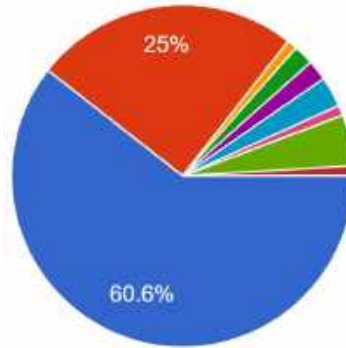

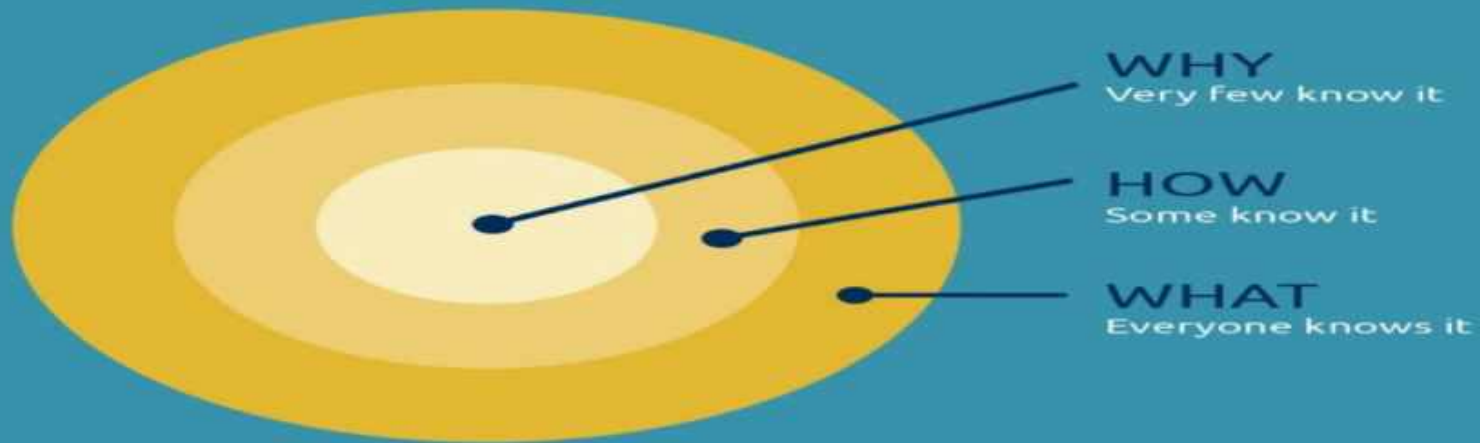

Technical Writing Course

ENG 325

COURSE DESCRIPTION: The intent of this class is to prepare students for the type of professional communication they are likely to engage in after high school. This course focuses on technical communication—the presentation of specialized information in an accessible way to a variety of different audiences, but audiences who, no doubt, will expect clarity, accuracy, and professionalism. This class focuses on preparing students for the reading and writing tasks that they will be required to participate in on job sites, in presenting themselves in a competent way to the world, and when studying to improve their position in life.

Pathway layout-

- **Monthly Distance Art Courses**-Student attends 2 (.25 HS credit per course)

- **Alaska Business Week** (.5 HS Credit/ 1 College Credit)
- **Rural Tourism or Marketing** (.25 HS Credit/ 1 College Credit)

- **Apprenticeship** (.5 HS Credit/ 2 College Credit)
- **Art Table Capstone Course**-.5 HS Credit/1 College Credit)

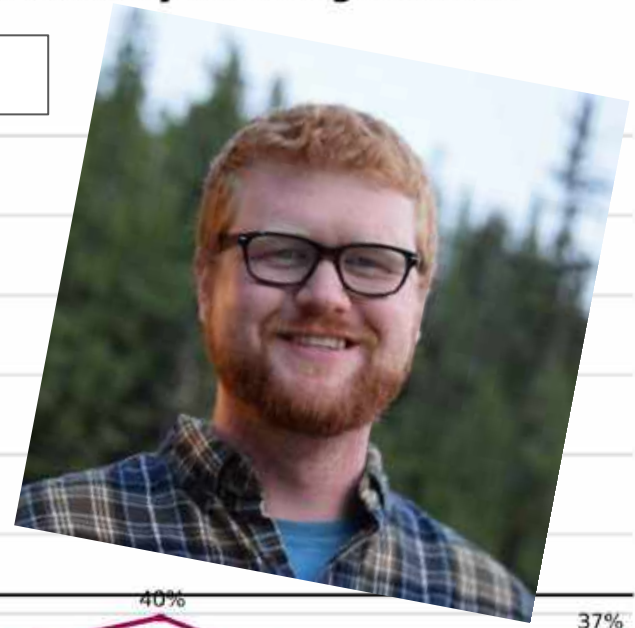
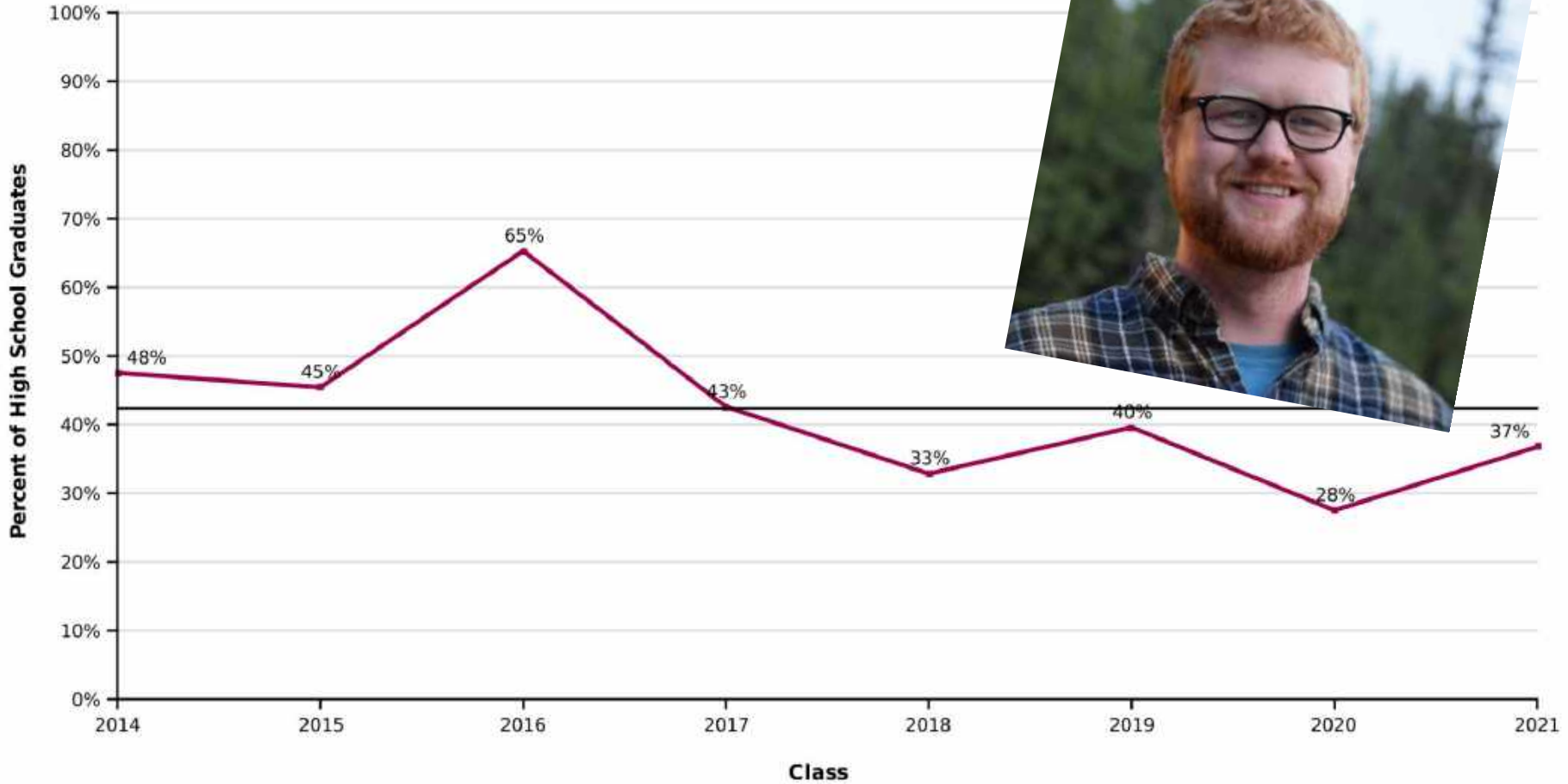
