Case Study #2a: On Campus Speech

Case Study #3: Off Campus Speech

Students post a video of a "white lie party" on Tik Tok, which comes to the attention of the school after a credible source at another school shares the video, which portrays students drinking. Messages on some students' t-shirts are associated with alcohol and drug use.
